Known as the Chairman's Award when first presented in 1984, it was later renamed in honour of its first recipient, Derrick Murdoch.





Elle Wild Strange Things Done





In 2001 she was inducted into Canada's Walk of Fame.




Melodie Campbell




Madona Skaff-Koren was a research technologist and now writes full time. She's published several science-fiction and mystery short stories.









Kevin P. Thornton




Ian Hamilton







Michael Betcherman




Sigmund Brouwer




S.J. Laidlaw




Hervé Gagnon




Andrée A. Michaud




Maryse Rouy








Bob Deasy spent over two decades deep undercover for the Ontario Provincial Police. He recently retired as a Detective Inspector and resides north of Toronto.




Charlotte Gray




Janet Brons




Steve Burrows

Danny, a young Native Canadian, is lured into an illegal bear hunt that ends in murder. To survive he must rely on his wits and the spirit world.








M.H. Callway




Eve McBride






Brenda Chapman




Barbara Fradkin




C.C. Humphreys




Maureen Jennings
