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Call for Judges

Every year, volunteers with a passion for reading support CWC in its quest to identify meritorious writing. The judging phase begins in November and ends with the selection of the finalists and winners in the April.

We are seeking judges who are:

- knowledgeable about the mystery and crime fiction and/or nonfiction depending on category (more about that below)
- willing to spend the time required to read the entries in their category
- prepared to provide 1-3 sentence assessments of the material they read,
- are proficient in the language of the award category they will be judging (English or French), and
- are willing to read ebook submissions

We welcome past and present CWC Professional and Associate Members who wish to volunteer; however, judges are not required to be CWC members. They can be librarians, editors, booksellers, teachers, writers, members of the justice system, genre afficionados, etc.

Although judges are usually Canadian, they do not have to be.

To ensure the integrity of the judging process, we do not announce which category a judge will be judging, but we will recognize each judge in the following ways:

- A certificate of appreciation
- Their names listed as a group in the CWC awards gala program
- Discounted membership (50%) for one year.
- Individual recognition on the CWC website and social media. (Judges can opt out if desired.)

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Award Categories with expected numbers and special considerations

- Best Crime Novel (Min. 50,000 words) 40-60 books Largest category but most likely to contain books that the judges have already read.
- Best Crime First Novel (Min. 50,000 words AND author's 1st novel in any genre.) 20-30 books
- The Whodunit Award for Best Traditional Mystery (Min. 50,000 words) 20-25 books
- Best Crime Novel Set in Canada (Min. 50,000 words) 20-30 books.
- Best Crime Novella (8,001 49,999 words) 10-20 books Some of these are written for adult learners. If identified as a "Rapid" or "Easy" read, they need to meet that expectation.
- Best Crime Short Story (Max. 8,000 words) 25-40 stories. *Entries are in PDF*.
- Best French Crime Book (Fiction and Nonfiction) 6-20 books *Must read French fluently*.
- Best Juvenile or YA Crime Book (Fiction and Nonfiction) 20-35 books Should know something about the guidelines for middle-grade and young adult books, and what is appropriate for the intended audience.
- Best Nonfiction Crime Book 10-20 books
 This category ranges from true crime to academic works. This is a good category for people with a background in journalism, academia, law or history.
- Best Unpublished Manuscript Round 1: 40-60 entries with first 5000 words and synopsis. Round 2: 10 manuscripts of 50,000 -80,000 words

 This category will be rated by each judge independently. The combine scores for each submission will determine the longlist of ten manuscripts the judges will read. The second round of scoring will determine the finalists and winner.
